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MARK COWLEY - One Player, Five Questions

"It's a life changer." But also, "It is what it is."

Mark Cowley is sitting on a sofa in his smart - lift-serviced - apartment, a small oxygen bottle at his feet, talking about the dire results of his encounter with Covid-19. The lift is essential because stairs, even just to the first floor, are impossible on a regular basis, and wouldn't work with Mark's non-electric-wheelchair, "top of the range." He has to use the wheelchair for trips out. Not a hint of complaint though in the whole two hours I was with him. One matter of fact comment, "Obviously I have bad days."


People who know Mark Cowley will suspect that it was his uncompromising nature that was key in simply not allowing him to die during his long nine months with acute Covid. Initially Mark was unconscious or merely semi-conscious in hospital, and afterwards pretty helpless in a care home. This was in 2020, before vaccination appeared, and experience had been gained in treating acute Covid. Not many people who progressed to the stage of needing sedation as Mark did survived in that first year.

Mark caught the original - for many people devastating - variant of SARS-CoV-2 early in the pandemic (he started feeling poorly in an unmarked van staking out two "high value" bailiff targets). He still has marks on his face from the oxygen mask he needed before being transferred to UCLH (University College London Hospital) to be sedated and given a tracheotomy for his breathing. He was kept unconscious for no less than eight weeks, and clearly remembers the, "hi, Mark," from the nurse when he came round. He couldn't reply because of the tube in his throat. He was in UCLH all the way through to mid-August. He speaks very warmly about this particular nurse, who provided wonderful support, including helping him deal with nightmares caused by the Covid. His first contact with his wife Bridgette after he became conscious again, via an iPad provided by the hospital, was incredibly emotional.

Mark saw many patients come and go while he was in hospital. Eventually he was told that there was nothing more that could be done for him there – his walking range by then had reached all of ten metres. He was transferred to a care home where his first experience was two weeks' enforced isolation, "a horror." At that stage he was an emaciated 50kg, against his fighting weight of 72kg. He's now back up to 61kg. Among the less reported problems of a long term hospital stay, in UCLH he developed an enormous bed sore on his coccyx that only finally

healed in March this year, eighteen months later. The photo he showed me is not for family viewing.

Mark's oxygen bottle is connected to a thin tube to deliver the gas. He resorts to it for perhaps half the time, but not when he's asleep. His lungs were severely damaged by the Covid. When he left the care home in November 2020 he needed full time oxygen, so his current status represents progress. And representing Mark's attitude, he has an exercise bike set up in the apartment, with his World and European Championship medals in direct view for encouragement. He has regular visits from a personal trainer. Overall, his condition is still slowly improving.

"I can get out, go to a restaurant..." Nevertheless, he has to take "boxes of tablets." And tellingly, "it's best when you lie down at night." Mark is part of a Critical Care Group from UCLH, supporting each other with regular Zoom meetings.

What a fascinating chat to have. I'd not known Mark particularly well. He had been a bailiff, that I did know. The squash records show that he won around 20 regional Masters tournaments, an Egyptian Masters o-45 title, three British Opens, two National titles and in pride of place, the 2010 o-55 World Masters gold medal in Cologne. World champion! To all of those titles you need to add ten club championships at The North London Squash Rackets Club, various County age group titles, five Intercounty Masters team championships - with Alan

Thompson, James Ockwell and Dulip Adihetty-and, this is a surprise, one All-Irish team championship, when he was persuaded to turn out for Connacht o-45s, and inspired them to their first ever victory at the national finals in Galway. In 2011 Mark was one of three players, along with Eamonn Price and Fran Wallis, to be given the first annual England Squash Masters awards, 'to players who had made a significant contribution to Masters squash, both on and off the court'.

Looking through the records, most of Mark's finals wins were won three games to nil. The various times I've watched him, I've always felt that he obliterated his opponents. The scores bear this out.

The Irish connection, and eligibility, come from Mark's family. They moved to London in the 1950s, his parents, two brothers and a sister. They lived in Euston, all six in a two-bedroomed flat, with a scullery in the open landing and a metal bath. The water was heated on a stove. The location determined Mark's early sport, football, and boxing at a local club. Plus swimming well enough to complete a cross channel swim relay. A skiing injury eventually put an end to the football, but by then Mark was enjoying squash, having started to play in a pair of roofless, concrete-floored courts in Khartoum. You had to wait till after sunset, when the temperature had come down a bit, to be able to play.

Squash was Mark's first racket sport. On his return to England, at the height of the squash boom, he had to wait six months to get into the North London Squash Rackets club. He started there in league 14, but rapidly improved. "I hit the ball hard and ran," nothing changes! In talking to Mark, his extensive thinking about the game, and about his opponents, is obvious. "They've all got frailties." As he improved, he learned a lot about conditioning from practising with James Ockwell and Dulip Adihetty, together with team mates from Hazelwood and Southgate Squash clubs, and Ian Bradburn and Allen Barwise, "mates from Wigan," who he used to visit regularly.

Bailiffing was just the most recent of Mark's careers. He is still a director of Marstons, the company he helped develop from a bit player in the sector to number one in the UK. He still does consulting work online for Marstons. Mark started out as an engineer for British Gas. This led to a spell seconded to VSO (Voluntary Service Overseas) in Omdurman, on the opposite bank of the Nile from Khartoum. There he lived in a mud hut, and at the age of 23, was introduced to squash. On coming back to England, he remained with British Gas, first as an instructor, then - here he gave a big grin - as a Welfare Officer, and finally in mainstream Personnel. "Being abroad taught me people were different."

Mark was with British Gas for a total of nineteen years. **Continued on next page**



He then set up a joinery business with a friend. That eventually "got hit" during the 1990s recession, and fell on hard times. Mark had always been interested in stocks and shares, and he spent a year as a 'Jacket' in the 'pits' of the stock exchange, playing the markets. He then did a year minicabbing, commenting, "I was lost." An opportunity came up to buy a café, the Chef's Kitchen, in Enfield. The owner told him he wasn't able make any money from it. Before coming to a decision, Mark sat outside the café for two whole days, simply watching the comings and goings. He transformed the business by wit, for instance a deal with a local baker to supply really nice bread, and hard work. Goodwill provided a large chunk of the substantial price when Mark eventually sold the business.

Why would you leave a set up like that? Well, an ad for bailiffs had caught Mark's eye. "I was just interested to see what they did." He joined Marstons, and after training, started knocking on doors. Fair to say, if Mark arrived at my house, one look and it would be, "Yes, Mr Cowley, welcome! Please come in! There's the tele! There's the code for the safe!

And would you like a cup of tea?" He completed the two rigorous years of qualification, and worked his way up via management to the Board of Directors. "Even in work, I wanted to be the best."

I wish I could have stayed for more of the bailiff stories. One involved a TV documentary, 'The Bailiffs', specifically about bailiffery that Mark had negotiated with the BBC. On a visit that was being filmed, Mark went into a property, succeeded in getting past the woman of the house to reach the mountainous man of the house, his target. Without ceremony, Mark was picked up and carried outside. Fortunately, the presence of a large camera crew, producers, gaffers, hangers on, maybe even David Attenborough, brought the debtor up short and dissuaded him from slamming Mark head first into the pavement.

With bailiffing, "every day was a different day," including the inevitable grapples, filmed or not. From being the smallest firm in the country, the Marston Group has ended up as the largest, employing more than 900 Bailiffs, more accurately 'Enforcement

Agents', and 6,000 staff. Mark was instrumental in trialling body worn cameras for Marstons many years ago, to weed out illegal practices. Today cameras are worn throughout the Police Force.

Mark has two sons from a previous marriage and he is enormously proud of them. Both are doing well, as the photos he showed me confirm. He and his wife Bridgette have been together for ten years. She first saw him playing squash in a county match at Radlett, of which Mark says, "It got feisty." Bridgette told him afterwards, "I didn't know you were like that!" But the ten years are evidence that 'like that' is not how Mark is at home. As for now, with Bridgette's help he is coping with his situation. He's had three emergency visits to hospital since he left the care home. A little while ago he lost balance and fell over backwards going up the steps to the entrance of his apartment block. In probably a good metaphor for his current attitude, Mark told me, "I got myself back up again."

Here in Mark's own words are his answers to the five questions.

Who was the best player you ever played? - Ross Norman

For more than five years and something like 500 matches, the legendary Pakistan Squash player Jahangir Khan was not only unbeaten, he was seen to be that rarest of sporting breeds, unbeatable. And then came along New Zealander, Ross Norman. He stunned Jahangir with a four set victory. I had the opportunity to play Ross in the British Open tournament at o-55, never getting near. He said he did his research on me!

2. What was your hardest match?

Boyd Kidd, Scottish No1, played in the quarter finals of the worlds in Cologne and was 2-0 down and playing badly and dead in the water in the third rubber. My support was fantastic and with them driving me on I managed to fight back to win. Special mention to Peter Alexander, a great competitive player.

3. What squash achievement are you most proud of?

Awarded English player of the year winning the Worlds in Cologne Germany and two European titles. Representing Middlesex County, representing Connacht and winning the Championship for the first time in Galway. Making friends for life throughout GB and Europe.

4. Would you swap your World Championship gold medal for a career with Spurs and twenty goals a season?

YES BUT NO BUT! The Gold medal is something special and I also get a buzz thinking about it today. Making squash friends for life throughout GB and Europe.

Fifth question, chosen by Mark:

5. Would I like to go back in time to change my life?

Answer is No I would not change anything because it's who I am today and what's shaped me, I believe that all events both good and bad, got me to where I am and what I have achieved in Life.

Covid has taken a massive amount away from me just as I was enjoying early retirement and living life to the full.

My message is we never know what's around the corner so live your life to the full now, look back on all the good things – my wonderful family many friends. Squash was a big part of my life and Squash Friends have remained true to me in my fight against Covid.

The Perspex court used for all the key matches was being delivered and assembled as we arrived!

It had been touch and go as to whether the Championships would be able to go ahead as two of the Squash Clubs that were venues for the majority of the matches had suffered serious flooding only three months earlier when the River Vltavar burst its banks. A remarkable

achievement on the part of the hosts to get the courts back in action.

Graham was having a good season and was top seed giving him a bye into the quarter finals where he defeated Bjorn Borgvall from Sweden, 3-0. Next up was the American, Michael Gough, whom he defeated in a close match 12-10 14-16 11-6 11-8. Nigel Belle had reached the semi in the other half and was then defeated by Berti Walli from Finland who had earlier knocked out the second seed. The final was a great occasion for Graham and the biggest match of his career. In a closely fought match Graham always had the edge and won 3-0 to become Over 70 European Masters Champion.

It was a good day for other GB Vets too, with Chris

Ansell winning the O65 title and Nigel Belle securing third place in the O70's.

This had been an unforgettable week of squash and sightseeing including the Castle and Charles Bridge, home to many souvenir shops and jewellery stores. There was a small price to pay before they left as Graham felt Pat should have some reward for tolerating a week of squash. And so, in the end, both came home with 'trophies' to remember his greatest moment in squash.

Hardest part of the trip? ... getting the trophy back through customs!!
