# **NEW WEBSITE**

#### Planned new features that are being developed for our new website

- 1. New Member Registration and Profile Management This feature is being developed to replace the current registration form. The new feature will allow members to maintain their own profile on the website to improve GDPR compliance and allow online registration for championships and fixtures in the future.
- 2. New Payment Gateway The Stripe payment gateway is being integrated with the website to allow credit and debit card payments for membership and event payments.
- **3. GB Vets Championships Events** Several features will be added to improve the way the Championships are displayed on the new website and to allow members to register online for events using the new payment gateway.
- **4. New Integrated Administration Email Service** New features are being developed to assist the GB Vets Committee send targeted templated emails to members using maintainable distribution lists.

- **5.** New Tournament Management Service A new service will be developed and integrated into the website that will have similar features to that provided to England Squash Masters. It will be used first for the 2025 Club Championships in May 2025.
- **6. Administrative Features** Several new administrative features are being developed to assist your committee.
- 7. Migration of Data from The Legacy Website All the remaining information that was held on the old website will be migrated to the new site over the next year. This is a significant task as much of the data needs to be reformatted. Many of the photos held on the old website were in a low resolution (small files) and this will be improved where possible on the new site.

Whilst some of the features have already been completed, many will be completed by this Christmas and the remaining will be completed during 2025.

# **STUART HARDY - One Player, Five Questions**

**Interviewed by Aubrey Waddy** 

At the end of the 2014/2015 season, Stuart Hardy was nominated as one of England Squash Masters' 'Players of the Year'. The citation included the comment, 'Stuart has played in nearly all the Masters events since they started'. That was the first ten years of ESM. The pattern has been mirrored in the subsequent ten years. In his remarkable squash career Stuart has competed in, word carefully chosen, well over 100 UK Masters events, plus numerous tournaments in Europe and further afield.

More details of Stuart's record will follow. For anyone looking into sporting success, his background is compelling. Stuart's aim, his quiet aim, has always been a simple one, to "play as well as I can." His attitude - again, his quiet attitude - is, "(squash is) a whole life thing." The passion in Stuart's presence at Masters events, even on court, isn't glaringly obvious. But it's there. In an outstanding generation of Masters players, he has won a remarkable tally of trophies.

A similar single-mindedness was at the root of his working career. Stuart spent his teenage years with his family in Zambia, where his father was a schoolteacher. The remote location didn't end his love for Marvel and DC superhero comics. His favourites were Spider-Man, the X-Men and of course, Batman. "Funny and juvenile," he happily says of his hobby. Maybe a hobby, but the early series in his collection are now worth thousands of pounds. The Superhero genre led Stuart at the age of eighteen, freshly back in England, "to want to make a difference." So he joined the police force.

Stuart thoroughly enjoyed the various parts of a long police career, as a detective, in the vice squad, the special branch, and finally in charge of the service in Salisbury. Retirement in 2000 freed him up to give more support to his second wife Karen in her antiques and restoration business, which was based in the middle of Salisbury. Stuart and Karen have four children between them, and five grandchildren. Stuart's son Stephen was a Wilts junior player. His grandson Aiden currently represents Wilts juniors, a fourth generation of Hardy squash players, in the lee of Stuart's Dad Hilton. Aiden is apparently not yet good enough to beat his Granddad!

Returning to Stuart's accomplishments, brace for a long paragraph. He has to date picked up twenty English regional Masters titles – the first in the Norths o-50s in 2004/5, and something like seventeen runner up trophies. To give context to the competition he has faced, in the 2013/14 season he lost no fewer than four regional finals... to the late Mark Cowley, Ian Bradburn, Jeremy Goulding and Peter Alexander; throughout his career, he has had to compete with an

outstanding group of players. Further afield, Stuart was a losing finalist in the World Masters o-50 Championships in Johannesburg (to Peter Alexander, "a great athlete") and in 2014, a bronze medallist in the o-60s in Hong Kong, losing to the formidable John McRury. In 2015 he won the o-60 US Open Masters title in Charlottesville VA. He has ten European titles to his name, four Jesters Amateur Championships, and in GB Vets, ten singles titles.

Stuart's ten years as captain of Wiltshire are far eclipsed by his England Masters career. What a thrill that has clearly been. "The first time I pulled my England shirt on it felt like winning the world cup." His first cap was in the o-45s, before the formation of England Squash Masters. He has played in seventeen Home International weekends, as captain ten times, and is proud never to have been on the losing side.

Missing from this catalogue of success for a full twenty years was the national title Stuart cherished. At last, in May 2024, he won the o-70 British Open title in Birmingham. It was, he says, "a joy and a relief." He had previously lost four finals, to Cowley, Clive London, Steve Johnson and Peter Alexander.

Stuart has an organised approach to preparation and competition. He tries to learn from the players he meets, considering them individually. "I do have slightly different tactics for different opponents, and try to impose my game." For the last eighteen years a bedrock of his training has been weekly sessions, in the gym and, intensely, on court, with Barry Featherstone. Indeed it was Stuart who first introduced Barry to court routines. Note the absence of gratitude at Masters events from Barry's opponents.

And there is of course a familiar background story: one of the costs of all the squash has been four knee surgeries, with injuries undoubtedly preventing Stuart from winning more trophies. "These things happen."

On a lighter note, although a passionate Englishman, Stuart is actually a dual international, having represented not just England, but... Thailand! During an extended holiday in the far East, Stuart played a chance game at the famous Hong Kong Football Club. This led to an exhibition match in Bangkok. His opponent was David Lines, the pro at the Bangkok British Squash Club and up to that time, the best player in the country. Stuart won 3-2. He was immediately invited to represent Thailand in the annual 'Hong Kong Threes'. With Stuart playing first string, the Thai team triumphed, winning the championship for the first time. Afterwards they enjoyed, "the best buffet I've ever seen in my life!"

Growing up, Stuart played "many, many, sports," cricket, badminton ("my best sport"), table tennis, golf (down to 8 handicap), a little football and rugby, but it was an injury from martial arts, and inspiration from Jonah Barrington's book, 'Barrington on Squash', that led him to join Wessex Squash Club in Swindon. He started, aged 24, at the very bottom of the box leagues, 28 of them in those days. A few years later he won the first of five club championships, plus many caps for Wiltshire, and twelve county titles, at o-35, o-45 and doubles.

A strong thread running through Stuart's squash life has been his involvement with England Squash Masters. He has huge admiration for Martin Pearse, with whom he helped to run ESM in its founding years. "We wouldn't be here if not for Martin," he says. For the last six years he has been Chairman of England Squash Masters, which goes from strength to strength. Stuart emphasises the contribution of the ESM committee, and he is proud of the early strapline, "We organise Masters squash in England, and support it worldwide."

At the end of Stuart's second decade of Masters squash, it's interesting to speculate how long he'll go on. However many more years it is, it will be in his own quietly effective way and will probably involve more trophies.

PS Just as we were exchanging messages to finalise the article, out of the blue Stuart came up with, "And I never even got to my remarkable collection of historical books on squash." Truly a squash nut, I thought. Stuart's next message said, "Something of a squash nut, as you've probably gathered." Yes!



#### Here are Stuart's five questions.

#### 1. What was your hardest match?

It wasn't one match, apparently, it was a good few. Against Mark Cowley! I would say my two Final victories over him were very sweet! Just very rare results! Mark would probably smile to hear Stuart's comment, "Mark was a nightmare to play."

#### 2. Who was the best player you encountered (on court)?

"Jonah Barrington." Stuart met Barrington while representing South Marston in the national club knock out tournament. "He gave me a lesson, a masterclass." Stuart made what sounds to have been a tactical error in winning some points early on with good drop shots, after which he was "lobbed relentlessly."

3. What was your biggest disappointment in squash? Stuart went to the 2024 World Masters Championships in Amsterdam with a realistic chance of winning. He had previously beaten everyone in

the o-70s draw. In the semi-final he led Robert Anjema 2-1 and in spite of narrowly losing the fourth game was confident of winning. At the start of the fifth, with a 2-0 lead, Stuart injured his suspect knee and could put up no more than token resistance after that.

# 4. With the experience you have now, starting again in 2004, what would you do differently?

After some um-ing and ah-ing, Stuart finally comes up with his response to this question: "Nothing! I've played all over the world, in twelve different leagues, many different teams. Maybe I could have played the odd point better!"

Fifth question, chosen by Stuart:

#### 5. Why do you play squash?

"I absolutely love the game, the skill, the preparation, the stamina, the gladiatorial nature of the sport. I'm going to play as well as I can for as long as I can."

# 2024 CLUB CHAMPIONSHIPS

A disappointingly smaller than usual entry for the 2024 Club Championships meant that the Tournament matches were played, predominately, all on Sunday 8th September.

With a few players in more than one tournament the logistics of scheduling were complex, and a couple found themselves with a very full Sunday, **David Parker** especially had a busy day.

The youngest age group in the Men's Singles was the Over 60 with only 4 entries. This was won by **Nigel Bacon**, beating **Teejay Sogunro** in the final. The other singles were won by **Allen Barwise**, **Stuart Hardy** and **Barry Featherstone**. **Dale McCarter** won the Non-County 40-49 and the busy **David Parker** the 60+ event.

The O'40 Doubles was won by **Dermot Hurford** and **Nigel Stiles**, the O'60 by **Stuart Hardy** and **Allen Barwise**, Allen having a particularly hard day as he also won the Mixed Doubles with **Catherine Ruffle**. An error on the marking sheet meant that in this match they played best of 5 to 15 points and the match

went the full distance. **Geoff Howes** and **Paul Temple** won both the O'70 and O'75 Doubles.

A break was held in the middle of proceedings for the 61st AGM followed by a superb buffet supplied by the catering team at Colets. A big thanks to Colets for again supporting The GB Vets and allowing us to hold our tournament on their courts.

Glassware was awarded to the winning and runner up players with the presentation of the Burrell Trophy to **Barry Featherstone** and the Norman Hunt Salver to **Geoff Howes**. As this was my final tournament as Tournament Director, I would like to thank all the players who have supported us over the past 19 years, and thanks also to my main helpers on the finals weekends of **Jane Belle**, **Jackie Kinder** and my wife **Chris**. I wish **Keith Ragg** all the best as my successor.

## Vodka & Red Bull Christmas Cake

## **Ingredients:**
